 - 4) Paintings have always been a source of inspiration for poetry. Respond from your reading of Thom Gunn's *In Santa Maria de Popolo*.
 - 5) How does Hughes make the fox the alterego of himself and his creativity ?
 - 6) How does the poet deal with identity crisis in the poem Digging?
 - 7) Jennings' portrayal of the 'purest grief' in the poem Child Born Dead.
 - 8) Symbolic nature of the house or 'squat' in The Good Terrorist.
 - Stage directions are essential in a play. Discuss Pinter's stage directions in relation to character development.

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- 10) Philosophical crisis experienced by George Moore in Jumpers.
- 11) Narcissism in Hawkroosting.
- 12) John Fowles portrays a characteristic 'Victorian woman' in *The French* Lieutenant's Woman. Respond. (8×5=40)

 - 14) Elements of Postmodernism in Nights at the Circus.
 - 15) Larkin's views on religion as revealed through the poem Churchgoing.
 - 16) Traits of postmodernism observed in the novel *The French Lieutenant's Woman* by John Fowles.
 - 17) Examine how personal history and political history are woven seamlessly together in the novel Waterland by Graham Swift.
