ON YOUR MARK, GET SET, GO!

Don Bosco Arts and Science College, Angadikadavu soars higher with another daring journey in the field of journalism. The news desk under the auspices of the Department of English is set to issue its first edition of the college news. The literary impetus is resulted in the form of a Newspaper titled, 'The Monday Mirror'. Kudos to the accurate reporters, meticulous editors, adaptable photographers and creative designers, and may this venture take you to the realm of precision and perfection.

Creating momentum in one's life demands the path of acceptance and renunciation. Doing a little more of the things that move us forward and a little less of the things that hold us back entail the factors of fortitude and wisdom. One of the sprinters who grabbed the limelight in the World Athletic Championship, 2022 at Hayward Field, USA, was Jamaica's Shelley-Ann Fraser-Pryce. She made history as she bagged a fifth World 100m title. Fraser Pryce, a 35 -yearold mother, had an electric start from gun to tape winning in a championship record of 10.67seconds. Jamaica had an unprecedented cleansweeep, winning gold, silver and bronze in the event. It is the first time a nation had swept the medals in the women's 100m at the worlds.

Fraser-Pryce is also the first athlete to ever win five gold medals in a track event at the World Championships in the same discipline, with this win following 100m gold in 2009, 2013, 2015 and 2019. "It was definitely something in the cards. It's special. It's my fifth world title in the 100m, and doing it at 35, yes I said 35!," said the gold winner. Bagging a gold medal at 35 in the world championship is a herculean task. One has to surmount all the ordeals and display prowess and valour to realise the goal.

Getting into the right track and setting goals require passion and valour. We all have times in our lives when we feel stuck or just tired of the tedious activities. We feel like we are not making the progress we hoped for and sometimes we feel like relinquishing it altogether. But it's not okay to give up. The most important thing is to recognise that one might need a rest or a reset. Successful people always look for new tactics to move closer to their goals and build on their accomplishments. The key to their success is momentum. We need to be reminded of ourselves of Newton's First Law of Motion. "Every object in a state of uniform motion tends to remain in that state of motion unless an external force is applied to it."

In short, there is a natural tendency for a moving object to keep moving, unless an external force interferes with it. Application of required strategies will bring about the desired changes and success. Let 'on your mark, get set, go' be the command for the future endeavours and undertakings.

The inter-departmental badminton and chess tournaments have awaken the enthusiasm and competitive spirit of the campus. Mr. Nithin Kuttan, Head of Physical Education, has recorded his imense happiness regarding the commencement of the inter-departmental competitions in an interview given to The 2000bay 20/irror.

In the light of the successful completion of inter-department Chess and Badminton tournaments, can you please share your thoughts on the up coming tornaments?

It was truly challenging to organise the inter-departmental competitions amidst the back-toback exams in the semester system. But we were able to plan the matches without creating any hindrance to the daily routine of the college. We couldn't involve the first year students in the competitions as the admission process is still in stand by at the University. But in the coming days, more such turnaments will be conducted after the arrival of the first year batches.

Can these competitions be perceived as ground work for the forthcoming inter colligate championships?

We have regular presence in most of the University Sports competition and often host such events in our campus. One of the prime objective of conducting the inter-departmental tournaments is to identify worthy candidates to represent our College in the intercolligate tournaments. Also, equal opportunities will be provided to other students including the first year batches who were not able to participate in these matches to prove their skills. The ultimate aim is to

As the head of the physical education department, how do you validate DBASC's performance in the University and national level competitions?

It is really tough for a self financing college to compete with Government and aided institutions in sports and arts because many students join these colleges through Sports/Arts Quota and are facilitated by the Sports Council and SAI. But even with the paucity of sports and arts quotas and other Govt facilities, Don Bosco has a history of securing 5th or 6th position in most of the inter colligate championships hitherto. Our students contributed 10 medals for the University in National level Tug of War championships. The best sports persons for the academic vear 2021-22 were from our College. It is to be noted that most of these students don't have a sports background. But it is from the campus that they underwent training and mastered the game. These achievements helped DBASC to make our presence felt in the University.

Do you believe that the long break during the pandemic outbreak has withered the sportsman spirit of DBASC? Covid had its effect on

all the activities of the University as well as the colleges, including sports. Most of the educational institutions struggled to organise competitions or to arrange training for the students. The bitter truth is that we couldn't conduct any major competitions during the pandemic situation. It had an unfavorable effect on the participation and the performance of the students in the University Sports competitions. But the University managed to conduct most of the event adeptly. We secured 5th position in the women's section and 6th in overall performance. Though it wasn't viable to conduct inter-departmental tournaments in the college, we were the runners up in both intercolligate Yoga and Tug of War championships. Inspite of the outbreak of the virus, we ensured that the students didn't lose their opportunities to participate in university arts and sports competitions, though it was tough to provide them with efficient training facilities. But now, we have a fresh and early start and hopefully aimming for a worthwhile participation in the University as well as national level competitions.

You have been a faculty of DBASC since 2016; What do you feel about yourself as a contributor to the institution's persistence as the best self-financing college under Kannur University?

It's my sixth consecutive year in DBASC. I joined the institute on the very next day after my graduation. But the management, staffs and the students were immensely supportive. I feel very much at home in the campus. When looking back, I feel truly satisfied for being able to play my part in retaining the legacy of the college which is the best self-financing college under Kannur University.
